

Using Campus Collaborations to Create Habits of Open Access at Concordia University



While Open Access is easily recognized as a public good, efforts to establish Open Access in universities face a number of challenges:

- The conservative structure of academic life reinforces existing habits and patterns of scholarly publishing
- The act of publishing is intimately tied to the professional and individual identities of faculty members
- Discussion about Open Access mandates can quickly raise questions of academic freedom.

Campus collaborations were effective in meeting these challenges at Concordia University, by:

- Securing pan-university support for a principle that has a complex impact on scholarly publishing, and
- Creating the necessary structures to sustain institutional Open Access practices.



Open Access At Concordia University

Concordia University in Montreal is one of Canada's largest comprehensive universities, with some 45,000 full- and part-time students and well over 1,500 faculty members on two campuses.

- ❖ In April 2010, Concordia became the first Canadian university to adopt an institution-wide 'green' Open Access mandate with the passage of a Senate Resolution encouraging faculty and students to make peer-reviewed research and creative output freely accessible.
- ❖ Active deposits of current faculty research in Concordia's Open Access repository (Spectrum) are maintained by Concordia University Libraries, notably using a database of publication alerts. Implementation of a usage statistics plug-in demonstrates concretely to faculty the impact of depositing research in Spectrum.
- By early 2011, the School of Graduate Studies required full electronic submission of all theses in Spectrum.
- ❖ An Open Access Author Fund was established in 2011.
- ❖ In September 2011, the University Senate approved the Berlin Declaration on Open Access to Knowledge.

These initiatives were realized through campus collaborations that ensured discussion, publicity, and support for Open Access thinking and action. The collaborative framework developed at Concordia is relevant to other universities looking to build and sustain habits of Open Access in campus scholarly practices.

The process, roles of the players, and key factors for success in this campus dialogue are detailed in this poster.
