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ABSTRACT

The Drama Therapy Database: A Comprehensive and Interactive Bibliography

Drama therapy is a relatively new method of therapy. In the twenty years it has been acknowledged as a professional field, a large body of literature describing its methods and theories has accumulated. The aim of this project is to catalogue what has been written to date, both by drama therapists and those who use drama therapy techniques. The database contains references for approximately 1400 articles, books and videotapes. The Microsoft program Excel 97 has been used to record the collected resources in a user friendly database. Thus, this project contains three components: a computer disk containing the database itself, a description of the assembly process, and a user's manual. To be able to access the information contained on the disk, the user must have available an IBM compatible computer with Windows 95, a 3 ½" disk drive, and the computer must have either Excel 97 or Quattro Pro 8 installed on its hard drive. The written component, in two parts includes a description of the assembly process, and contains a number of charts distilling the findings of the database. The second part is a Technical User's Manual, which consists of a clear set of instructions on how use the important functions of the Excel Program. The document contains two appendices. One is a list of the search terms that can be used to refine the database, and the other is a hard-copy of the database itself. With this database, an interested party can find all that has been written within the field of drama therapy on any population, theoretical approach or technique, and define searches to their personal needs and interests.

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Part 1: The Process of Assembling The Drama Therapy Database:

Rationale:

In fulfilment of the Master's Degree of the Creative Arts Therapies at Concordia University, there is a research component. In the second year, this can take the form of a research paper based on clinical work with your clients or as a research project that contributes a fresh perspective on the field of Drama Therapy. Because I was philosophically unprepared to conduct research with my clients, while working with them, and because of the constraints of my internship placement, I decided to investigate a different type of research project. This Drama Therapy Database is the result.

My intention is to catalogue every drama therapy article, resource and book written to date. Of course, there is no absolute value that can be addressed to this endeavour as delimiting where the field of drama therapy begins and ends. This, I have discovered, is a virtual impossibility. However, at the time of this writing, there are approximately 1400 articles and books catalogued pertaining to the techniques, practice and theories of drama therapy. It is as comprehensive as the resources that I have available to me have allowed, and I am satisfied that I have not missed any major contributions to the field.

I feel like this is an important task at this time as the first defining books on drama therapy, *Drama in Therapy, Volumes 1 and 2* (1981, Schattner and Courtney), were published nearly twenty years ago, and are now out of print. Since then, the field has bourgeoned, training

programs have been created, professional associations started, and the validity of the work being done is starting to be recognized in much larger contexts. As we pass into the new millennium, new resources will continue to be produced. At this stage, the volume is still manageable. However, I hazard to guess, in the next five years it won't be, if this type of cataloguing is not done now. To my knowledge it has been done twice before, once in 1982, and then updated in 1991. Others may have done this work but the products are not commonly available, and certainly there are some comprehensive reference lists at the back of some books, but to sift through these individually is not making use of the modern conveniences of the computer age. For these reasons I have made this assembly of resources and structured them in this manner for maximum enhancement of the field of drama therapy.

Structure of The Drama Therapy Database:

The database is written with the computer program Excel 97, on an IBM compatible computer. It is interactive and simple to use. The structure of the Excel database allows the capabilities of sorting and refining specific searches of the contents. The 1400 articles, essays, videos/ audio tapes and books are organized into seven columns with the headings: **Article Title, Author(s), Journal Title/ Book Title & Editor(s), Date of Publication/ Publishers, Population/ Context, Approach/ Techniques, and Other Keywords.** It is accompanied by a comprehensive User's Technical Manual that describes how to use the Sort and Search/ Filter features, and how to Print the results (See Part 2: User's Technical Manual). Appendix A gives a condensed list of the descriptors and search terms that were used to classify the found documents. The process of how I decided to define these parameters will be discussed

later in this document. Appendix B is a hard copy of The Drama Therapy Database, sorted by Author(s), Date of Publication, and then by Journal Title/ Book Title & Editors.

Delimitations:

In finding the various data entries, a decision had to be made in each case whether to include it or not. Even before I started, I had decided *not* to include *Psychodrama* references. The volume of work in this discipline is so vast that I felt that it was not possible to include it and do it justice, while maintaining the integrity of the drama therapy portion. I do acknowledge the importance of the contributions of psychodrama in influencing the practice of drama therapy, especially in some individuals' work, and for this reason I did include some articles about techniques that are often employed by drama therapists. I did, however, include most of the sociodrama articles I encountered, because in terms of my understanding of sociodrama, it falls in a grey area between the two disciplines. I included a number of interesting articles comparing drama therapy and psychodrama, and a few essays by drama therapists about psychodramatic techniques. I differentiated between the two disciplines based strictly on the title of the work.

Not included because of their vastness, as well as the cost of retrieving the articles, are *Unpublished Dissertations*. Their value is undeniable, and many have had their work later published. However, the difficulties of finding complete listings, both in North America and abroad, was too large a task for the scope of this initial database, and have been excluded for these reasons. In the future, it would be a very worthwhile venture to catalogue and even

assemble these previously done works, the volume of which is increasing exponentially, as more training programs are created and the field grows.

As I have collected articles and references, other delimiting decisions have had to be made. In my own experience of people employing drama therapy techniques, there is often a large cross over with *Sand Tray or Sand Play Therapy*, especially in the early stages of dialogue with a client. I have included the sand tray therapy articles I found as I worked, but did not search for them individually.

The same is true of *Play Therapy*. My personal opinion of drama therapy when working with children, especially under approximately seven years old, is that the difference between play therapy, dramatic play and drama therapy is more often defined by the person conducting the sessions and not by the techniques themselves. The differences would be virtually indistinguishable to an observer. Many drama therapy theorists, especially those working in Britain, use both methods, and have published articles within both disciplines. For these reasons I have included the play therapy references I encountered in the research, but again I did not search for them exclusively.

When I was looking at the interdisciplinary journals and books, often there were articles aimed at Creative Arts Therapists or Expressive Arts Therapists. I have included many of these, especially those that pertain to the distinction of *Creative Expressive Arts Therapies* as its own profession. As you can see, because the nomenclature was not constant across

various sources I have combined the two names as the label I have used in referring to such articles, because it will provide a better search title for those looking for either word. At the same time, it enlarges and defines the practice.

In terms of other *Creative Expressive Arts Therapies*, as with psychodrama, I cannot deny how often various methods and techniques are borrowed and adapted for drama therapy work. However, I only infrequently included articles that were not *interdisciplinary* (*Creative Expressive Arts Therapies*) and employed drama therapy as part of the technique. There is the occasional one, but I take ownership of the fact that they were included more out of personal interest than out of relevance.

At times I have included articles from the fields of *Drama in Education*, *Creative Dramatics*, and *Developmental Drama*, especially those that are working with special populations. These articles tend to be older, before or on the cusp of the development of drama therapy as a distinct practice. I included these articles both for their historical value, and because, here again, the differences are in the definition of the person conducting the sessions. The techniques are relevant and valuable. I did not include the more recent articles and publications from this field, with the exception of those written by well-known drama therapists, generally before they crossed from teacher to therapist.

Occasionally *Psychology/Psychotherapy* journals will reference drama therapy techniques, without calling the work drama therapy. Role playing is a good example of this. When I

encountered role play, enactment, recreation, scene playing-type descriptions in my research I included them in the database. I also came across *Action Therapy*, which also seemed to share very similar principles to drama therapy, therefore these articles, though not specifically sought out, have been included too. I have included these types of references, though not specifically about drama therapy, because they enlarge the knowledge of our techniques for ourselves and others, and, if for no other purpose, help us define who and what we are not.

Though referenced often in many published works, I have *not* often included the writings of major theorists outside the field of drama therapy, but upon whose principles much of the drama therapy ethos is based. I made an exception in the case of both Goffman and Winnicott, for whom I included one work each, because they were referenced so frequently by drama therapists.

The other field from which I included the occasional article is *Theatre*. There are quite a few articles written by, for the most part, psychoanalysts that compare theatrical texts to therapy processes or contexts. I have included these, and when an author references play text as a metaphor for therapy I generally label this Dramaturgy- Text/ Metaphor. The other area of theatre research I have borrowed from are studies on the psychological effects of performance on actors. I believe that these studies can also be related to clients of drama therapy.

And, of course, I have included articles about *Drama Therapy* specifically. One of my major

incentives for this project originally came from the frustration of not knowing who had written what in the edited volumes of drama therapy work. Unless in possession of the book it is often very difficult to find the contents and contributors, and I found myself and my fellow students often missing important references for papers because one of us had not bought the book yet. Thus, in the preparation of the database, I have not only included the titles of such books, but given a breakdown of each of the articles or essays contained within. As well all the relevant articles from *The Arts in Psychotherapy* and *Dramatherapy*, *The Journal of the British Association of Dramatherapists (BADth)* are catalogued and included.




Figure 1. Breakdown of The Drama Therapy Database by Field

Figure 1 illustrates the breakdown, in percentages, of the various fields from which the resources were collected. This is a function provided by the Excel program.

Collection of Resources:

As I have mentioned above, I have entered a large variety of information from a variety of sources. My process in doing this has followed this path. My starting point was the PsychLitt CD-ROM from the Concordia library. It was only current to 1997. A search for "Theatre" and "Therapy" rendered nearly 200 articles, of which about 150 were relevant. The search for "Drama" and "Therapy" resulted in about 179 articles. Many of these had to be discarded, because often the abstracts referred to the "drama" of peoples' lives or the "drama" of their experience in therapy. Out of the 179, I kept approximately 50 new articles because there was also a large cross over with the first search. These initial 200 articles were the foundation of the database. I downloaded the abstracts and used those keywords as a basis for my own search terms. I entered each reference into the appropriate database columns one at a time and then entered the search terms.

If I were to start this project again, I would keep track of where I retrieved each entry. This would be especially valuable for validating my accuracy and correcting any errors I have found. Unfortunately, it is quite detailed work and one error in typing can invalidate the whole entry. As I collected entries, I often found inconsistencies in publication dates, publishers, volume and page references. Reference lists in books can be particularly fallible on this point, because once entered it is nearly impossible to spot the error. Another issue that has surfaced from time to time are books that are published by more than one company, especially when no edition is noted. I have used the more common publishing companies' names in most of these cases because they have been easier to verify and because they are

more readily available. I admit that there are some books I know exist, but because the lists I had found did not contain a publishing date or publisher, I have not included them in this version. There are entries that are incomplete anyway, but usually this is not my oversight, but an unavailability of the correct information. If I am unsure of the reference, I have usually noted it with a “?”.

From the PsychLitt download, I continued to the Internet. I accessed the Jessica Kingsley and Routledge web pages (Jessica Kingsley's is especially well organised and easy to use) as I knew them as major resource publishers for the Creative Expressive Arts Therapies. Here, occasionally, I was able to download the table of contents for edited books to manipulate in the correct format and enter into the database. This was very useful when it happened, but listings for edited books are not consistent. I was able to cross reference this information to the hard-copy catalogues I had requested by email. At times, the catalogues contained chapter breakdowns that the Webpage did not provide, and I typed these in by hand.

Obviously, I have a passion for both books and collecting. In my personal library I own a large number of the basic drama therapy references. I used these quite often to verify accuracy of my downloads and to fill in areas where information was missing. Interestingly, the PsychLitt download would occasionally mention a random chapter from one of these books, but not the rest. Those that I had not already captured, I entered by hand. From the original resource, I was also better able to define my keyword entries more accurately. For the most recent publications, I have had to depend solely on the downloads because I have not yet

purchased the books themselves.

The Concordia library fortunately owns complete sets of the two major drama therapy reference journals, *The Arts in Psychotherapy* and *Dramatherapy*, *The Journal of the British Association of Drama Therapists (BADth)*. I photocopied the individual indexes of each volume of these journals, and entered the information by hand. I went to the library, armed with these print-outs, and wrote in the keywords after glancing over each article. I found out after I had done this that *The Arts in Psychotherapy* has a Webpage with indexes of volumes dating back to 1995. There are no abstracts, and I was not successful at downloading the information in a format I could use, but I was able to print the most recent volumes that the library had out for binding, and entered these by hand too. The address for *The Arts in Psychotherapy* Webpage is entered in the database. The British Association of Dramatherapists does not have any Web information that I could find.

The next step was to look at what I already had, and try to find Webpages for other publishers that had numerous books on the list to see if there were some references that my previous searches had missed. This was only marginally successful because some publishers were either out of business or did not have Webpages. For those that were listed on the Internet, the pickings were quite meagre. I tried the large on-line book stores. They came up with a few items of some interest, but for the most part their listings were very incomplete.

At this stage I turned to written material in my possession. I used the two bibliographies I

mentioned early, from 1982 and 1991, which were very complete and well formatted, but out of date. I found many of historically interesting references on these lists. I imagine because drama therapy literature was quite scarce, even ten years ago, they included a number of sources I have excluded, ie: dissertations, psychodrama and creative dramatics. However, there were numerous entries to be copied from there. I must note at this point, I have not researched what the legalities of using titles and authors' names from other sources are. I apologize to any people or resources that I have unwittingly mistreated or misrepresented.

After I had finished this process, the drama therapy database contained approximately 1200 articles. To verify the references I had already accumulated, and to discover what I was still missing, I went back to my personal collection of books and journal articles and read through each suggested reading, bibliography and reference list. As I encountered literature and other resources that I had not yet found, I entered them. During the whole process I was continually updating the search terms in the appropriate columns. I found another 200 or so articles this way, to bring the total to approximately 1400.

It is through this process that I found references that, at first glance, seemed to hold no direct bearing to the field of drama therapy. My logic was that if I observed a resource that was continually referenced by multiple drama therapists researching for their own articles, then the work most likely merited inclusion. Another area in which I was liberal about including are articles written by well-known drama therapists that were not specifically about the practice of drama therapy itself. One of my goals was to include all the works published by certain

individuals, even if the article seemed not be relevant. I did this to round-out the perspective of what certain authors have achieved; and in so doing, highlight what other possible extensions exist for drama therapy practionners and to provide insight into some of the outside influences and contexts at work on the individual's methods and practice.

As I continued looking for more articles in the reference lists of other drama therapy articles, I finally reached a point where the resources I was finding had already been included or seem to hold more and more distant relevance to the database. I decided I had accomplished what I had set out to do. With this information compiled and with the search terms entered to the best of my resources, I went on to create the graphs that are included later in this paper. I made these breakdowns of the information garnered to distill various points about what is being accomplished within the field of drama therapy, and to highlight the influences upon it.

Rationale for the Choice of Row Headings and Database Organization:

The row headings, as mentioned earlier, are **Article Title, Author(s), Journal Title/ Book Title & Editor(s), Date of Publication/ Publishers, Population/ Context, Approach/ Techniques, and Other Keywords**. The first column on the far left, **Article Title**, contains the names of individual articles from journals and essays from edited books. They have been kept separate from the books themselves, which appear in the same column as the journal titles. This column is called **Journal Title/ Book Title & Editor(s)**, and contains the name of the editor books containing multiple essays.

(Figure 2 is a sample of what The Drama Therapy Database looks like. These are the first ten entries, when the database is sorted by author.)

The **Author(s)** column is self-explanatory, with the exception that due to the way the database program functions, the lists appear in alphabetical order (when sorted by author) by the first named entered in the cell. To find a specific author, who may not be listed first on the publication, and thus not first in the cell data, it is necessary to use the **Search/ Filter** function (See Part 2: The User's Technical Manual).

The **Date of Publication/ Publishers** column contains information of both articles and books. In the case of articles from journals, the date, the volume, the issue in brackets (if available) and then the page numbers appear. In the case of books, the date of publication appears first, then the place of publication, and the name of the publishing company. This is the column where I have found the most inconsistencies, so as I mention above, I have noted the information I am not sure of with a “?”. The date of publication is always first so, if interested, the user can order the database chronologically using the **Sort** function (See Part 2: User's

Technical Manual).

These first four columns are simply recorded information from a variety of other sources, and have been subjected to little or no interpretation on my behalf. The same is not true for the next three columns.

The following three columns **Population/ Context, Approach/ Techniques, and Other Keywords**, have been designed for use with the **Search/ Filter** function and for easy topic browsing for the user. Nomenclature is not common across various schools of thought and has changed over time. Therefore, to make finding articles that are relevant to the user's needs easier and faster, I have selected search-terms to represent the major concepts of the article and book; for example: "preschoolers", "latency aged girls", and "pre-adolescents" and "ten-year-old boy" would all be labelled "Children" in the **Population/ Context** column.

Designating the row headings names and search-terms, for the most part, were straightforward decisions. The column that has given me the most difficulty is **Population/ Context**. I was very conscious of not using stigmatizing or pathologizing discourse in the creation of the database. I have been caught between brevity and instant recognition of meaning and political correctness. I am still not entirely comfortable with naming the column "Population", and have tried to soften the impact of assigning one or two words to summarize all that a person is coping with, by adding "Context".

In the choice search-terms for the column, I tried to maintain this consciousness. I have chosen to use, for example, "Schizophrenia" as opposed to "Schizophrenics" to avoid labelling people by their diagnoses. I have used other terms like "Developmental Delay" (to encompass what author's called in the titles "Retarded", "Learning Disabled" (in the British context of the label, not North American), "Mentally Subnormal" and "Mentally Handicapped") and "Psychiatric Disorders" (to encompass labels like "Psychotic", "Mental Illness" "Chronic Patients" and "Sociopathic") to summarize all that is implied in the author's choice of words without being pejorative or stigmatizing toward the person/ people in question. It is important to note that many of the articles I have collected date back as early as the 1930's, and, as with all things, there have been fashionable and widely accepted ways of describing issues, diagnoses and coping styles. The words that I have chosen are the best that I could determine based on the reality of the fact that we do label and stream people based on our assessment of their needs, and I chose terms that are as close as possible to what is deemed politically correct at the end of the twentieth century. (If you feel that I have not succeeded in this consciousness, or in the process of using the database come up with better search terms for any of the columns, please feel free to contact me and make suggestions. See the end of The User's Technical Manual for a contact number.)




Figure 3: Breakdown of the Drama Therapy Database by Age of Population

Whenever possible I have put the person first, in terms of what we all have in common, age (children, adolescents, adults, elderly) and sex (male, female). Figure 3 illustrates a breakdown of the articles contained within the database classified by references to age. It provides some insight into the concentration of attention to certain populations. In this graph

I have excluded articles that are written with professionals as a target audience. It pertains simply to articles that have mentioned the age of the individuals. This is somewhat skewed as a result of the fact that not all articles discuss any client group at all, but describe simply theory. The other factor that skews this chart slightly is that I have not accessed all the articles individually, and if, this was the case, I have distilled the age of the population in question from the title. Not all articles are so labelled, thus explaining the rather large percentage of Non-specific or Unknown references. This does not greatly impact on the relative percentages within the other fields however, as the number of unknown, age specific, articles is relatively small.




Figure 4: Breakdown of The Drama Therapy Database by Specific Population

Outside of the breakdown by age, many authors reference more specific qualities of the person that has led them into therapy. Figure 4 is a more specific breakdown by clinical population. I used as the hundred percent value all the articles that were specific in their

context or client group. As one can observe a large proportion of articles contained within the database are aimed at other professionals, creative expressive arts therapists or drama therapists, as their target audience. Most of these articles concern training, professional development, supervision or professional associations. This chart is slightly skewed by the fact that a few articles address more than one population at a time. If this is the case, the same article may have been entered as a value in multiple fields. My concern was not so much numerical accuracy, but an overall view of who was being worked with and who was not receiving as much attention.




Figure 5: Breakdown of The Drama Therapy Database By Author

The next column is the **Approach/ Techniques**. Within the field of drama therapy, there are a number of practitioners/ theorists who have developed their own distinct manner of working; examples of these are Robert Landy's *Role Theory*, David Read Johnson's *Developmental Transformations*, Renee Emunah's *Five Phase Model*, Sue Jennings and Ann Cattanach's *Developmental Paradigm/ EPR (Embodiment, Projection, Role) Model*, Alida Gersie's *Narrative Approach*, and Steve Mitchell, Brenda Meldrum, Marina Jenkyns, Phil Jones and Sue Jennings' *Theatrical Approach*. Figure 5 shows all the articles specifically about drama therapy in the database broken down by author. The total number of articles and books that are specifically about drama therapy is approximately 700. These do not include the articles written by drama therapists pertaining to other fields.

To briefly summarize these approaches, and how I defined them to label the resources of the data base, I have included a short description of each.

-Robert Landy's *Role Theory* is based on a number of influences, including Jungian archetypes, Sarbin's Role Theory, and to some extent dramaturgical-type analysis of stories or text. At times his method of working holds some similarities to the *Theatrical Approach*. His basic tenets are that the personality is a system of interrelated roles, and one needs *aesthetic distance* in order to be able to observe them. This comes through storytelling, myths, embodiment and projective techniques. The goal is to tolerate the ambiguity of the roles that the individual plays and to create a more functional system (Landy, 1983, 1990, 1991, 1997).

-David Read Johnson's *Developmental Transformations* is based on developmental paradigms such as Piaget and Erickson. The method starts in early stages of sound and movement and progresses toward role play and improvisations. Winnicott and Authentic Movement also have influenced this approach. Some of Johnson's basic principals are the *Play Space* (an understanding and agreement that all that happens within the session is acting and pretend) and *Impasse* (when the play space is broken or the action dies, an *Impasse* occurs which indicates to the therapist that there is material that needs further exploration). The therapist is basically a screen or puppet for which the client projects their issues onto, and together they "play" with them. The goal is to discover and explore the stages of development that the client has blocked or is stuck in, and through the play, with the therapist

as guide, progress through that stage to improve the quality of life (Johnson, 1982a, 1982b, 1991).

-Renee Emunah's *Five Phase Model* consists of Dramatic Play, Scenework, Role Play, Culminating Enactment and Dramatic Ritual. Emunah's approach is very pragmatic, and her style of writing includes lots of practical tips and activities. The method, to some extent is influenced by Psychodrama and many of the other drama therapy techniques. The approach basically distills a very useful method of drama therapy that is applicable across most populations (Emunah, 1994).

-Sue Jennings and Ann Cattanach's *Developmental Paradigm/ EPR (Embodiment, Projection, Role) Model* is similar in basic theory to Developmental Transformation. It is based on Piaget's theory of child development through the stages of Embodiment or Sensory Play, to Projection of play onto objects, and then to the taking on of Roles. This model has been used with many populations, but has been especially applied to Play Therapy with children (Cattanach, 1992, 1994)

-Alida Gersie's *Narrative Approach* uses stories, myths, fairy tales, folk tales and legends to contain the issues of the client. It uses material from outside texts and literature as well as the client's own stories. Using these narratives as a metaphorical platform, the drama therapeutic work then uses ritual, movement and embodiment to explore the issues. (Gersie, 1991, 1996, 1997)

-Steve Mitchell, Marina Jenkyns, Brenda Meldrum, Phil Jones and Sue Jennings' *Theatrical Approach* often uses text or paradigms of theatre (like those of Brecht, Grotowski, Artaud, and Peter Brook) in the therapy process. Like the *Narrative Approach* it uses theatrical literature and structures to contain the work of the client (Jennings, 1992; Jenkyns, 1990, 1996 ; Jones, 1991, 1996; Mitchell, 1990, 1994; Meldrum, 1993). Occasionally, but not always, this method leads to "*Theatrical Performance*". There are numerous practitioners who describe the benefits of engaging in public performance or performance within the therapeutic milieu. There is also a subcategory of "*Theatrical Performance*", which is "*Theatrical Performance with Special Populations*" which encompasses, generally, public performances of text-based or self-advocacy pieces presented by clinical populations. *Theatrical Performance* can come out of a variety of different approaches and methods.

To continue exploring other search terms in The Drama Therapy Database, in the **Approaches/ Techniques** column, there is a third category, stemming out of theatrical literature and traditions, which is not as much a clinical approach, but a search term I created to describe a group of articles that are more philosophically based. These are often written by psychologists with an interest in theatre or theatre professionals with an interest in the psychological. I have called this category "*Theatre and Therapy*". It refers to articles that compare the theatre process to the therapeutic one, or vice versa.

A fourth category is similar, but based more upon theatrical literature as a metaphor for pathological disorders or therapy. Often this category will be specifically about a script or a

playwright. It is named “*Dramaturgy- Text/ Metaphor*”. These words will usually appear together, but not in all cases.

Most of the titles for approaches have come from the writer’s themselves, and I have retroactively applied their model of working to most of their earlier works, (before they had coined the name), to trace the historical development. The exception to this is when an author is writing on an entirely different subject. There are a lot of grey areas between approaches, techniques and search-term categories where they overlap. I have, in the **Approaches/ Techniques** column, liberally applied labels when they may have only a little relevance. I have done so to encompass as much information into the search terms as possible.

All drama therapy articles are classified as such first, and a “-“, and then by approach if possible (ie: *Drama Therapy- Five Phase Model*). Of course, there are more non-specific drama therapy approaches that the authors have not established as paradigms or methods. Some of these are labelled simply “*Drama Therapy*”. Sometimes it is not an established method the author is working with, instead there are techniques employed that are common and useful to know about when searching for relevant articles. As with the approach specific articles they are labelled “*Drama Therapy*” and followed by a “-“ and then the technique (ie: *Drama Therapy- Myth/ Symbolism/ Metaphor*). I have used this method when describing the techniques in other fields too (ie: *Play Therapy- Storytelling*, or *Psychology- Role Play*).

Projective techniques, specific and non-specific, compose an important part of some drama

therapy methods. They are, when possible, broken-down into: Puppets, Mask, Make-up, Video, Dolls, Props, Objects, Drawing, Creative Writing. For a more complete list of all the columns' search terms, please see Appendix A.




Figure 6: Breakdown of the Drama Therapy Database by Techniques

Figure 6 is a graph illustrating a breakdown of some of the most common search terms from the **Approaches/ Techniques** column. It is not entirely comprehensive, but it reflects some of the major areas. Because it does not include every search term included, it is not statistically accurate. This graph depicts techniques from all fields from which resources were garnered.

The third and last column, **Other Keywords** contains more defining search terms. When they have been available, the specific contents and topic breakdowns from within the article have been used to define its themes even further. This moves in two directions, toward more generalizability, or toward refinement. From a general standpoint, I have tried to describe the article in broad terms of being principally about Theory, Theory and Techniques, Specific Techniques, Assessment, Assessment and Evaluation, Research, Multiculturalism, Historical Perspective, Educational Context, Supervision, Training, Transference/Countertransference, Therapeutic Relationship, Process, Aesthetic Distance, Clinical Examples or Case Studies. These are some examples of the larger, and less specific search terms employed in describing the articles. Other clinical areas and methodological descriptions also used.

In the opposite direction, toward refinement, I have tried to include the major theorists the author references if it is key in defining the article (ie: Brecht, Artuad, Grotowski, Peter Brook, Winnicott, Jung, etc.). Another refinement could be specific texts or scripts named by the author (ie: Shakespeare's "The Tempest" or "King Lear", Peter Shaffer's "Equus"). Other keywords that are specific and significant in defining that article as an individual work are also included. Because this area is oriented to defining the specific articles, the search terms are often as specific and individual as the articles themselves.

The Profile of an Ideal Article:

The field of drama therapy is so new and so diverse that even when the intended audience is other professionals, no assumptions can be made on behalf of the writer in terms of the

reader's knowledge of the orientation, population and techniques with which the writer works. As I have reviewed about 70% of the creative arts therapies and drama therapy literature contained within this database, I feel it is safe to claim to be an expert on skimming resources. I have made some observations about the profile of the "easy to read and understand" article.

In terms of making writing accessible and practical for the reader, I have found the following to be true. A comprehensive title that describes both the population and approach and, if possible, the article's purpose is a great asset when a researcher is still in the initial stages of culling for valuable resources. An introduction that describes these factors from the outset, is an even a greater asset. In the section following this abstract-like introduction, a review of how the methodology, approach or philosophy being discussed has evolved, either in terms of past literature or the author's own experiences, orients the reader quickly and allows them to gain insight into the theoretical underpinnings of the work. A description of the context or population that the work is happening in or with is a necessary, and yet often overlooked, component that furthers the reader's understanding. Articles that are broken down into small sections that are clearly labelled are much easier to understand at first glace. Even if the article is theoretically based, most greatly benefit from being grounded with clinical examples. This is especially true of technique descriptions. Some of the best articles I have read have contained transcripts of the work itself (longer than one or two lines of dialogue). This is particularly valuable to students still trying to discern the flavour of drama therapeutic work. To augment the transcripts, reflections of the drama therapist about what they thought at the

time and since, add further depth to the writing. My favourite articles are ones that also include specific descriptions of techniques and activities they have found useful and valuable themselves, and those which also include practical tips. Realistic descriptions of how the work is structured within the context of which it is unfolding gives enormous insights to the reader. This may include the referral process, assessment, the treatment goals or structure, the setting (institutional or private), and evaluation of the work as it continues. Eleanor Irwin or David Read Johnson's articles are generally good examples of my observations. I have found their articles very easy to grasp upon first glance, which encourages me to read the entire article in depth. Many of the articles contained within *The Handbook of Dramatherapy* (1994, Jennings, Cattanach, Mitchell, Chesner, & Meldrum) and *Dramatherapy: Clinical Studies* (1996, Mitchell) have lured me in the same way, due to their clear writing and easy to understand descriptions of the contexts and techniques of the work being discussed.

Future Possible Extensions:

As I have written, I have mentioned some of the areas that merit change or extension. One subject I have ignored until this point, somewhat purposefully, is the division and differences between North American and British methods, techniques, and approaches. Interesting and diverse work is also happening in Israel, Ireland and Greece. I have not mentioned the regional location of the individual writers to create a comprehensive overview of the entire field of drama therapy. It would be interesting to create an additional column noting the cultural and geographical location of the author.

Another area that I observed as deserving of future investigation is the common references used by many drama therapists from outside the field. As I neared the end of the data entry, and was using the reference lists in various books and articles, I started to become very interested in the “genealogy” of drama therapy. Some very disparate approaches are influenced by similar schools of thought, and there are certain fundamental areas that most drama therapists seem inclined toward. I would like to return to our historical roots in developmental drama, Slade, Spolin, and Way; anthropology; psychology, Winnicott, Yalom, Jung and Klein; Goffman and Brian Bates, and the theatre of Brecht, Stanislavski, Artuad, Shakespeare and Peter Brook, to observe the most commonly referenced materials by drama therapists. From within the field of drama therapy itself, I would like to create a “hit list” of the most commonly mentioned books and articles. I started to see patterns that were emerging, and could almost envisage the “family tree” of drama therapy. Perhaps from the top of this tree, a united theory of drama therapy, one that unites the various approaches, would be visible.

With the scanning technology available today it is possible to scan a document, run it through a text recognition program and save it as a word-processing file. This could be an invaluable resource (to be used privately, of course, due to copyright laws) for those rare, out of print and obscure documents that have been noted in The Drama Therapy Database. The database could be linked to these documents, or at least record the file name of where to find the scanned document in an additional column.

And of course there will always be more articles to add. This is a living document. It interacts with the user. It influences the user, and the user has the power to influence it. As long as drama therapists write, this work is not finished. It will be prone to revisions as new theories emerge, as populations change, as sophistications in software develop. My hope is that I have summarized what has been accomplished to this point, and perhaps smoothed the path into the future for those who use The Drama Therapy Database.

Part 2: User's Technical Manual for The Drama Therapy Database

Introduction: Compatibility

This database was written with the Microsoft program Excel 97. It is compatible with Corel Quattro Pro 8 and is saved as such on the floppy disk. It should also be compatible with dBASE and Lotus 123 programs too, depending upon how the original document was saved. It should also be compatible with a Macintosh computer, given that it has a sophisticated enough spreadsheet function. (Macintosh does have a version of Excel.) If the user is not using the original software, Excel 97, the author cannot guarantee that the database spreadsheet will function as it was originally designed.

This manual is designed for those using an IBM compatible computer, with Windows 95 and Microsoft Excel 97 already installed on the hard drive (usually C:\). The following installation and user information should be similar for other IBM software programs using the Windows format. Given that all computers are set-up slightly differently, I cannot anticipate the exact defaults or other formatting differences of your individual computer and software. I have made an effort to maintain standard defaults, however, if what appears on your screen is different from the information contained within this User's Manual, this is partly to be expected. In the case of that you are using Quattro, most of the functions are similar, but not identical to what is contained within in this user's manual. When there are great differences I have noted them.

Getting Started:**Opening Excel:**

Double-click on **Excel** icon on your desktop, or go to the start-up menu (the **Start** button in the bottom left corner of your screen with the Window flag icon), and under **Programs** double-click on the **Excel** icon there. It looks like a piece of paper on an angle with a blue X superimposed on it, or just the blue X. The **Excel** program may be in a Microsoft subfolder on the start-up menu. Double-clicking on this icon opens Microsoft **Excel 97**. It will open, relatively quickly, to a blank worksheet.

If opening The Drama Therapy Database (TDTD) from a floppy disk or the hard drive:

From this blank worksheet, the next step is to open The Drama Therapy Database. Double-click on the yellow folder icon on the top toolbar, **Open**, or go to the **File** pull-down menu and double-click **Open** there. It will open to a default directory, most likely to your C:\ or hard drive.

If this is the first time you are opening The Drama Therapy Database (TDTD): it will be on a floppy disk, 3 ½" format. On the top tool bar, it will say **Look in:** and then there will be a space with, most likely, the **icon for the hard drive** (a little blue box with a dot) and the **C:** prompt. The easiest thing to do is to click once on the little down-pointing **arrow button** on the end of that space. It will offer you a menu of folders or drives to open. If TDTD is on a floppy disk (even the little hard disks are called floppies), select that drive name, most likely **A:** or **B:**. It will probably tell you which is appropriate for a 3 ½" disk. Double-click

on it. This will open the floppy disk drive. Insert the disk into the disk-drive until the little button on the machine pops out. The disk-drive green light will come on, and a list of the items on the floppy will appear on the screen. Highlight **The Drama Therapy Database** with your mouse pointer and double-click. This will open the database. A message will appear at the bottom of you screen saying “**Opening The Drama Therapy Database**” with a counter bar. It takes a few moments to open as the file is very large.

If TDTD is already installed on your hard drive: open the folder in which it is stored, highlight **The Drama Therapy Database** with your mouse pointer and double-click. This will open the database. The same as opening the file from a floppy, a message will appear at the bottom of your screen saying “**Opening The Drama Therapy Database**” with a counter bar. It will take a few moments to open due to the size of the file.

If you don’t know the name of the folder where TDTD is stored, go to the Windows Start-up Menu (bottom left corner) and highlight **Find** (the icon is a piece of paper with a magnifying glass). This will open a dialogue box. Under **Files or Folders**, type in: **The Drama Therapy Database** (spelling counts), and makes sure the **C:** drive is designated to search in the bottom **Look in:** box. After the search is complete, it will list **The Drama Therapy Database** and a file/ path name; remember it for easier opening next time (ie: mine is **C:\Tina\RESEARCH\The Drama Therapy Database**). Double-click on the **Excel icon** that will be at the front of the name. This will take you directly into **The Drama Therapy Database**.

To save The Drama Therapy Database (TDTD) from the floppy to your hard drive: once the program is opened from the floppy disk, go to the File menu and click on Save As. It will ask you to choose a location to Save in: and you may have to go through a similar process as earlier to get to the C:\ drive, using the small down-pointing arrow button at the end of the top space. Choose a folder in which store TDTD. You do not need to retype the name of the database, as it should appear in the bottom dialogue box already.

Using The Drama Therapy Database (TDTD):

The following instructions explain how to use the vital functions of The Drama Therapy Database to find articles, books and resources that are pertinent to your specific needs and interests. The database information is organized in such a way that it can be either searched for by any word(s) or string of letters in any of the cells (with the Filter tool), or reordered according to any of the column headings (with the Sort tool). Once you have found and organized the information you want, then there is instructions on how to Print your results.

IMPORTANT NOTE TO ALL USERS:

Though there is a Protection feature in Microsoft Excel, it disables both the Filter and Sort capabilities, so it has not been used. This means that if you make a major error or change the data in any way, it will possibly change the database permanently. The fail-safe for this is that the floppy disks have been overwrite protected, meaning that the changed information cannot be resaved back onto the original disk. If you attempt to save the changes on the floppy disk, the computer will give you an error message.

However, if you are working from the hard drive, where the original information was downloaded, this fail-safe does not protect you. It is recommended that, unless the changes are intentional, you always hit the “No” button when ending your session and exiting the program and it asks you to **Do you want to save the changes to Drama Therapy Database?** Do not, at any time, use the **Save** icon (the floppy disk icon) on the toolbar, or hit **Save** under the **File** menu, as the computer will not question if this is what you intend to do, and will overwrite the file. The only protection from this is going back and reinstalling the original from the floppy disk.

How to SEARCH (Filter):

Once the Drama Therapy Database is open, you should see across the top line: **Article Title; Author(s); Journal Title/ Book Title & Editor(s); Date of Publication/ Publishers; Population/ Context; Approach/ Techniques; and Other Keywords.** This is the *Heading Row*. Underneath the *Heading Row* a row of little down-pointing **arrow buttons** should appear, one in each column heading. If this is not the case, go to the **Data** pull-down menu and choose the **Filter** submenu, click once beside **AutoFilter** and the menu should close and the down-pointing **arrow buttons** should appear at the top of each column, in the *Heading Row*.

These **Filter arrow buttons** allow for searches for words, names, etc. Click on one. The first item on the **pull-down menu** is **(All)**. Always go back to **(All)**, and double-click on it to return to the full selection. The next item is **(Top 10...)**; frankly, I have never found this

function of any use. The next item is the important one for defining your search (**Custom...**). Appearing on the pull-down menu underneath (**Custom...**) there will be an alphabetical list of all the words/ names which are entered first in the cells. Any of these maybe scrolled to and highlighted (See: A Note about **Scroll Bars**: below). If that exact value is represented in more than one cell, then a list of the rows containing that cell value will appear on the screen. If that cell is unique, then only the one row will appear. However, when more than one name or search term is entered in a cell, only the first will appear in the alphabetized list. If you are looking for the *specific* word or name in the cell contents, and it does not appear first, then a search must be done to find individual item(s).

To search any column for any value or string of letters highlight and click on (**Custom...**). A dialogue box will open. Its title will be **Show rows where ...** (the column heading of the arrow button you clicked, for example: **Author(s)**) and a dialogue box that shows the default **equals**. At the end of this dialogue box there is another small down-pointing **arrow button**. If you click on it, it will give you choices such as “does not equal”; “begins with”; “is larger than”; “is smaller than” and “contains”. “Contains” is generally the most appropriate for finding whatever you need in this type of database. However, I have found it simpler to type a * (shift 8 on most keyboards), representing strings of letters or words that come **before and after** the word/ name that you are interested in.

For example: To find all the references that contain Autism/ or Autistic in the title of the Article, under the **Article Title** column, click the **arrow button**, click (**Custom..**), write *auti* in the dialogue box (This will capture all variations of the

word). Then the screen will list only those articles with “auti” in the title. You may capture some that are not relevant but they are easily overlooked.

The **equals *auti*** is the same as using the **contains** option, but remember that the asterisks have to go **before and after** the letters, word, name you are searching for, because, rarely, will one word be alone in a cell.

The arrow at the top of the column you used to define your search will now be **blue**. To return to the full database, click the **blue arrow**, which will give you the **pull-down menu** again, double-click on **(All)** and the whole listing will reappear.

The example was used in the Article Title column to make the point about variations on words, however, this is not the best way to do a comprehensive search, for just this reason and others. The Article Title column does not contain the book titles, only journal articles or individual essays from edited books. Also, language is not common across often different sources and schools of thought, and words such as Diagnosis, Evaluation, Interview, Analysis may all mean or imply Assessment. For this reason, there are additional columns of search-terms provided (**Population/ Context, Approaches/ Techniques, Other Keywords**), and I would recommend starting searches there. (Also see Appendix A)

The **Filter (Custom...)** dialogue box contains the option to search for two search-terms or keywords simultaneously. It gives you an “**and**”/ “**or**” choice.

For example: in the last column, **Other Keywords** if you type *archetype* (to find all articles that discuss the use of archetypes) “**and**” *theor* (to find all articles containing theory or theoretical), the list will be reduced to only those articles that have been classified as both dealing with archetypes “**and**” theory. However, if you use the “**or**” capability, the list will include all the articles on archetypes and all the articles that are about theory.

At the bottom of all the alphabetized items in the **pull-down menu** under the down-pointing **arrow buttons** in each column are two more useful search items: (**Blanks**) and (**NonBlanks**). These menu items allow simple searches in each column.

For example: to review a list of only books (not essays or journal articles), go to the “**Article Title**” column, use the **scroll bar** to scroll to the end on the list, and highlight (**Blanks**). The result will give you a list of all the books in The Drama Therapy Database.

From shorter selected search lists, you can use other column headings to refine the list more.

For example: to find out what Robert Landy has written about children click on the down pointing **arrow button** in **Author(s)**. Write *landy* (it is generally **not** case sensitive) in the (**Custom..**) blank, this will give the list of all of Robert Landy’s work. Then click on the down-pointing **arrow button** under **Population/ Context** and write *child* and this will further refine the search to only articles about/ for children that Landy has written.

To return to the whole list you must click on both **blue arrow buttons**, and highlight (**All**) on each pull-down menu to return to the whole database. This will not work in the case of trying to refine a search twice in the same column, instead use the “and” option.

To see a listing of some of the majors categories and search-terms entered in the TDID, in the **Population/ Context, Approach/ Techniques, and Other Keywords** columns, and an explanation of how they are used, turn to **Appendix A**.

A Note about Scroll Bars:

Scroll Bars facilitate movement through the database. They appear on the far right side of the screen and along the bottom. At the top there is an up-pointing **arrow button** and at the bottom there is a down-pointing **arrow button** (on the vertical scroll bar). On the horizontal scroll bar the movement is side to side. There is a small box that slides up and down depending on the arrow button that is being clicked. This box indicates how close to the top or bottom in the document the view is. The view can be changed one row at a time, by clicking the up **arrow button** to up and the down **arrow button** to go down. Faster scrolling can be done by holding your finger down on the **mouse button**, when the mouse pointer is on an **arrow button**. A third way to scroll is to click on the small mobile box itself, and **drag** (by holding down the **mouse button**) to the approximate place in the database you believe what you’re looking for would be, ie: halfway down the slider for references beginning with “L”.

Yet another way to move around the document is with the **black highlight box**. **IMPORTANT NOTE TO ALL USERS:** The **black highlight box** will always be somewhere in the database. It is a heavier black outline surrounding a cell. It is a danger, as whichever box it is surrounding is designated for changing. Typing when the box is highlighting a cell will erase the cell contents, and replace the former contents with the new typed information. If this is intentional, (which is fine, even encouraged, modify the database to your own needs or interests. Double clicking on a highlighted box will not erase the contents, but provide a cursor for the contents to be changed without losing the current information), leave your changes and save upon exiting. However if the changes are unintentional, immediately, before doing any other typing, go to the **backward curved arrow icon** on the **top toolbar**, and click on it. This is the symbol for **Undo**, and it will undo the changes that have been made to the cell. However it only undoes the last action, and if the undo button is not the first typing after the error, it will not retrieve the information. The **Undo** function can also be found in the pull down menu under **Edit**. Remember, if you do not want to save the changes to the database, always click on the “**No**” button when exiting the program, and the dialogue box asks if you want to save the changes.

Despite its dangers the **black highlight box** can be used in association with the direction keys on the key board for a fourth option of moving around the database. Ideally all searches and sorting options can be done with the scroll bars, on-screen buttons and mouse alone, without troubling your self with the keyboard, (except to write in your search-terms).

How to SORT:

The Drama Therapy Database has the capability of changing the order of the information in the database depending on the **Sort** instruction. It can be ordered in alphabetical/ numerical order by any of the column headings: **Article Title, Author(s), Journal Title/ Book Title & Editor(s), Date of Publication/ Publishers, Population/ Context, Approach/ Techniques, and Other Keywords.** When a column is designated as the **Sort** column the rest of the database information reorganizes itself to maintain its structure (ie. the whole row moves together into the new order).

The **Sort** command is on the **Data** pull-down menu. Click on **Data**, then click on **Sort**. This will highlight the whole database and a dialogue box will appear. It says **Sort by:** and has a blank space with a down-pointing **arrow button** that lists the column headings. Choose the column heading you want to sort the list by. All the items in The Drama Therapy Data base will be incorporated, and reordered. You have the choice of **Ascending** (smallest value to largest value, alphabetical order) and **Descending** order (largest to smallest, reverse alphabetical order). **Ascending** is the default value, which will happen automatically, unless you click on the button beside **Descending**.

The **Sort** function can sort by just one or multiple column headings. There are three spaces in which to choose headings. Each of the subsequent boxes have a lower priority than the one above it.

For example: To group the Journal Title/ Book Title & Editor(s) together, and have them appear in alphabetical order, and then in the sequence in which the articles were published; (ie. all the *Arts in Psychotherapy* articles grouped together in order of their date of publication) in the first blank **Sort by** box, open the list of headings by clicking on the down-pointing **arrow button**, highlight **Journal Title/ Book Title & Editor(s)**, and it will appear in the blank space. Then repeat the process in the second box labelled **Then by**, only this time choose **Date of Publication**. If the third **Then by** box is empty leave it. If it contains a value then click the **arrow button** and highlight **(none)**. Then click on **OK**. It takes a few moments for the computer to reorder the list to the new specifications. This is normal. (The database is formatted by Author(s), Date of Publication and then by Journal Title/ Book Title and Editor when you open it.)

Important SORT Tips:

- If you are using Quattro Pro 8, as you will have probably noticed, there a **Sort** function contained within the **Filter** selection under the down-pointing arrows in the Headings Row, in addition to the **Sort** function under the **Tools** menu.
- The computer will not allow you to sort if two of the **Sort by** boxes contain the same value.
- If the black highlight box is off edges of the information cells containing data, the **Sort** function will not work.

-If for some reason, the column headings do not appear, but you see Column A, Column B etc., double check that the button beside **My list has header row** is highlighted. Once in the preparation of the database my computer mysteriously undesignated my header row, the solution to this problem, should it happen to you, is below in **How to Print: (Sheet)**.

-If you are sorting by the Population/ Context, Approach/ Techniques, or Other Keywords columns, the information is often ordered differently by what seemed to be of the most importance in the article, and often contains multiple entries per cell. Thus sorting by these columns will not guarantee that all the articles with similar subject matter will be grouped in order. In the Population/ Context column I have tried to keep the age of the population first (ie: Children, Adolescents, Adults, Elderly), and tried to order the cells by age, Children appearing first etc. However subsequent labels will not appear always together. For these columns, if you are interested in a particular group, approach or keyword it more efficient to use the **Search/ Filter** mechanism.

-When you do a **Search/ Filter** and have a more defined list of articles that you are interested in you can reorder the shortened list without exiting and reordering the entire database. Simply use the **Sort** mechanism on the selected list as you would on the entire database.

-If you are using the **Sort** function, but have a row, column or cells highlighted (in black) in the database (intentionally or by accident), you will receive a dialogue box before the **Sort** is continued. It will ask you if you want to: **expand the selection?** Always make sure this is

the highlighted option. (It is the default.) If you do not expand the selection, it will simply reorder the highlighted portion, and the structure of the database will be mixed-up. If this happens, be sure to *not Save* the changes, in process of use or in exiting.

How to PRINT:

This is the most complicated and the perhaps the most useful of The Drama Therapy Database functions. It will print what you have on the screen, for example the shortened lists of articles on topics of specific interest for you to take to the library to find. To print the whole database takes very long time (over an hour and a half on my printer), and honestly, is not much use in its entire written form, because it is simply too much information. It prints in a very small format to fit on a single page (8 ½ x 11), about the equivalent of 6 point font. On 8 ½ x 14 sheets, you can afford to go to 8 point, but it takes a little readjustment. To print the entire database on 8 ½ x 11 paper is about 72 pages, on 8 ½ x 14, it is 96, but much easier to read.

To print your list, first go to **Page Setup** under the **File** menu. This opens a dialogue box with four headings: **Page, Margins, Header/ Footer, Sheet**.

The **Page** page is first. Make sure that the **Paper Orientation** is **Landscape** and not **Portrait**. If you are using **8 ½ x 11** paper, click the dot beside **Adjust to** and use the up-pointing **arrow** button to adjust the size to **65%**. The default is **100%**. This will fit the data base onto one sheet of paper, without changing the default margin settings. At the bottom of this window, double check that you paper size is correct and if it is not use the down-pointing **arrow**

button at the end of the space to specify **8 ½ x 11** (it is the default and will generally be correct). If you have **8 ½ x 14** paper, click the **Adjust** to toggle button so it is highlighted and use the arrows until **85%** shows in the box. Ensure that your paper size is correct, **8 ½ x 14**, (see above) in the bottom box.

The next page is **Margins**, to access it click on the **tab** at the top. The default margins that are preset should be fine.

The next page is **Headers/ Footers**. It appears that once a custom header/ footer is designed it is stored forever. I have not figured-out how to remove my old ones, so you will see them there. The default is **(none)**. You can click the down-pointing **arrow button** to see these and the other defaults, or create you own. If, for example, you are printing multiple custom lists, it is wise to label them. To do this click on **Custom Header** and write the title you desire in the box. There are three columns available for your custom header to appear in the left, the middle, or the right. There are instructions on the page that tell you what the various icons that appear there are. They can, for example, insert automatically the date or time, page number, or the filename. The same apply for **Footers**. Custom design the printout to your specifications and satisfaction.

The last page is **Sheet**. This is where it gets slightly more complicated. For the **Heading Row** to appear at the top of each page you print (which is helpful), ignore **Print Area**, because it will print everything unless you specify otherwise as a default, and go to **Print Titles**.

Hopefully, it says in **Rows to repeat at top box:** **\$1:\$1**. If it doesn't, you can try typing this in. It ideally will have worked to designate, in programmers language, the top row as the headings to repeat. If it says anything else but **\$1:\$1** (with no space) it will not print the correct heading row. If this is the case it is also likely you have been having trouble with your **Sort** function in that the correct headings are not designated. **The solution that was mentioned above is this.** There is a gridded icon with a red arrow at the end of the **Rows to repeat box** click on it. It will take you to the top of the database. Click the grey "1" on the far left side. This 1 (1,2,3 down the side and A, B, C across the top) is part of the border that surrounds the screen, so make sure that you have scrolled to the top entry. This will be the Header Row. This will highlight the whole row. Go back up to the now floating dialogue bar which should now contain the **\$1:\$1** and click on the little icon with the white box and the red arrow. You will be back to the **Sheet** page, with the correct row designated. I have found this operation touchy in the past and for some reason, not entirely consistent, so proceed with caution.

In addition to this, this page also asks some other questions. Do you want the **Gridlines** to appear? I usually highlight this box because it makes the printout much easier to read. The Drama Therapy Data base is in **Black and White** already, but if you have added colour, there should be not a dot in this box. Ignore **Draft Quality**, if you want. I have never used it. Ignore the **Row and Column Headings** box because this highlighted will print the numbers down the side and the letters across the top (which only take up space on the printout, so I don't bother). They may be useful to you. If you do chose to print these, it will change the

width of the database. To ensure this does not make the data spill over onto another page, check with the Print Preview (see below). If it has spilled over, this can be fixed two ways; either go back to **Adjust to** and reduce the amount another 5% (65% to 60%), or see below for margin adjustment.

On each of these four pages there are three buttons along the right top side, **Print**, **Print Preview**, and **Options**. **Print** will send your list to the printer, but you do not want to do this until you have checked your **Print Preview** to see that everything is to your satisfaction and all the settings are correct. If these are not correct, they can muddle your printout easily, and since it takes quite awhile to print, it is worthwhile previewing. **Options** will take you to your individual **Printer Options** specifications and unless there is a problem to troubleshoot later, it shouldn't be necessary to go there. Perhaps only to check that the paper size that you designated under **Page** is correct on these pages.

Click on **Page Preview**. This will open a screen that appears as your paper will appear, only much smaller and there is a toolbar across the top. Check that there are all the columns on the one page (there should be 7). If there are not, click on **Page Setup** from the toolbar, and return to the **Page** page. Shrink the size by 5% under **Adjust to** and return to **Page Preview** to see if it all fits now. Another option is to click the **Margins** button and drag the margins on the page slightly larger. (when its positioned on **black margin tabs** the mouse pointer will turn to a line with an arrow on each side. Click on the tabs at the outside, hold the **mouse** key down and drag it slightly larger toward the edge of the page.)

To view the database in its real size click on the **Zoom** button on the top of the page. Double check that your **Headers** and **Footers** are where you wanted them and spelled correctly. Click on the **Next** button and ensure that the **Row Headings** have appeared on each of the subsequent pages. Have the gridlines appeared? If you are satisfied with the product you see on the screen then click on **Print**. If there are problems, go back to **Print Preview** under the **File** menu or click on the **Setup** button on the top tool bar to check your settings. I have learned to use this program through trial and error. Good Luck

Troubleshooting:

-**The database is floating and smaller than the screen size:** In the top right-hand corner are three buttons: a “-“; two small squares with dark lines across the top, one overlapping the other; and an “X”. Click on the middle button, one large square with a dark line across the top icon should appear and the view should take up the full window. The “-“ makes the window disappear entirely, but it is still open, and is indicated by a small dialogue bar in the bottom right-hand corner, Click the larger square with a dark line icon for the window to return to full screen size. Clicking the “X” will make the window close and must be reopened using the **Open** icon or using **Open** on the **File** menu.

-**An empty page appeared instead of The Drama Therapy Database when I opened it:** The file that you open is called The Drama Therapy Database. As whole is referred to by Excel as a *Workbook*, the main page is labelled The Drama Therapy Database. It is a *Sheet* or *Worksheet* of the *Workbook*. The other sheets contain no information. If you have an

interest in making more specific search-refine lists, you can Copy (not Cut) and Paste from the first worksheet to these blank sheets. Movement from sheet to sheet in the workbook is done with the small left-pointing and right-pointing arrows in the bottom left corner. Or you can click on the tabs, Sheet 2, Sheet 3, etc. If you open The Drama Therapy Database file, but is not visible on the screen use the left-pointing arrow buttons to change worksheets, and the correct page containing The Drama Therapy Database information should appear.
