Collective crisis, collective solutions – within hours


In a national emergency, the population is capable to respond with adequate solutions within hours, provided they have a platform to prioritize needs (popular consensus), and create common projects.

Such participatory process avoids the pitfalls of top-down, centralized decision-making: power stakes, misconception of field realities, limited workload, popular resistance, unintended consequences.

We present how the Swiss culture of direct democracy can be boosted with open-source technology.


700 years ago

1'000 to 10'000 representatives attend their *Landsgemeinde* each year to vote on their cantonal issues.




1848

After civil war, a **federal state** is built. **Popular initiative** and referendum are adopted to balance centralized power.




1891-1959

To ensure stability beyond beliefs and cultures, the Federal council adopts rules of proportionality and *consensus*.




March-May 2020

As covid erupts, the Federal council takes 18 ordinances that *deeply affect* the daily life of *eight million citizens*.




May 2020

Thousands of *citizens draft* solutions in 3-day web events. Despite urgency, they multiply *competing projects*.




July 2021

Citizens vote on reinforcing executive powers *till* 2031. *Citizens capacity* to define their future together *is ignored*.




Our proposal


We adapt the Landsgemeinde and consensus rule to **technology** that enables **to mobilize millions** of people.
